




How are people experiencing Lyndale Avenue South right now?

Driving and using transit on Lyndale Avenue






Walking and biking on Lyndale Avenue

Why is this a pilot project?

- Lyndale Avenue South is a complex corridor
- 3-lanes is not within guidelines based on current national guidelines
- County is piloting 3-lanes to measure impact on safety and other metrics
- Opportunity to collect community/stakeholder feedback, observe challenges and consider options moving forward




Pilot project goals

Overview of 3-lane pilot project

Lyndale Avenue between Franklin Avenue and 31st Street will be restriped from four driving lanes to three

- One travel lane in each direction with a center turn lane
- Parking will remain on both sides of the road
- Transit stops will remain in similar locations





4- to 3-lane considerations

- How will the restriping impact on-street parking, turn lanes, bus operations, transit, pedestrian crossings, and safety for all users?
- How will residents, businesses, property owners, and users be benefited and impacted?




Lyndale Avenue South safety improvements
