- a new 911 call center being built in Plymouth;

- Opening of the long-awaited *Van White* bridge;
- A pilot project called Workforce Incentive Network (WIN) to try to reduce the number of people in North Minneapolis on public assistance;

- New pedestrian and bicycle bridge on the Luce Line Trail to safely cross over Xenium Lane (CSAH 61);
- Recycling grants to businesses, schools, and apartments;
- Funding for the Bassett Creek
  Watershed Management Commission
  for water quality improvements in Golden
  Valley;
- Job training and jobs for formerly incarcerated individuals;
- Foster homes and adoptions;
- A new sister counties program;
- A new Target Field Station (formerly

Interchange) *transit hub* to be open before the All-Star Game;

- Added bilingual staff to the Domestic Abuse Center;
- Youth sports grants;
- Breaking ground on first natural public swimming pool in North America at Webber Park.

# County board approves 2014 budget

#### 2014 Hennepin County budget calls for 0.57 percent decrease in spending

On December 17, 2013, the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners approved a 2014 county budget of \$1.78 billion – a 0.57 percent decrease from the 2013 budget, and a 0.98 percent increase in the net property tax levy from 2013.

In addition, the board, acting as the Hennepin County Regional Railroad Authority (HCRRA), approved an HCRRA budget of \$27.7 million, with a proposed property tax levy of \$24.0 million – a \$3 million increase from 2013. The HCRRA seeks to improve rail modes of transportation to reduce traffic congestion and improve mobility.

The board, acting as the Hennepin County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HCRA), approved an HCHRA

budget of \$15.2 million, with a proposed property tax levy of \$6.97 million – an increase of approximately \$535,000 from 2013. The HCHRA authorizes strategic planning and community engagement to serve the housing and economic development and redevelopment of Hennepin County.

Hennepin County has maintained a top triple-A credit rating from all three rating agencies for 38 years. The top rating reflects strong county management overall, as well as sound financial condition.

# Get help paying your heating bill

Utilities Xcel and CenterPoint Energy have affordability programs to help qualifying customers lower their monthly heating bills and pay past due balances. If customers make their monthly installment payments, they will only be paying up to 4% of their annual household income toward their past due balance.

To qualify for the program, customers must have received a Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) grant for the current heating season. Households who are at or below 50 percent of the state median income are eligible.
